

The Arabian Collection

Synopsis of Collection: This is a collection of material generated by Richard LeBaron Bowen, Jr (1919-2014) who worked for ARAMCO (Arabia American Oil Company) from 1945-1947 in Ras Tanura, Saudi Arabia. Although his day job was as a chemical engineer supporting the building of an oil refinery, he had a significant amount of free time. He developed a passion for archeology, Arab Dhows and long trips while on leave throughout Europe. He published several books on Archaeology, Arab Dhows, and maritime industries. He would later return with the famous archeologist Wendell Phillips in 1950 as the Technical and Engineering Advisor to the American Foundation for the Study of Man Arabian Expedition, which conducted archeological excavations in South Arabia.¹ His publications would continue through the 1950s.

Description

Many books, articles, research notes, extensive film (prints, slides, 8mm movies), shells, rocks, and clothing contained in 28 boxes. There is potentially an unpublished book ("Ships of the 4th millennium BC") in BX_5703.

We have grouped the material into five categories:

1. Images: photos, negatives and movies
2. Journals & Publications: Publications, Letters, journals and stories about the local people
3. Nautical Files: Research notes on Arab ships and marine life
4. Reprints: There are 225 reprints of his books and articles.
5. Objects: Shells, Rocks, Pottery and Clothing

Under the direction of Dr. Phillips, the AFSM expeditions included: The South Arabian Expeditions I and II excavating the Qatabanian capital of Timna, the Timna Temple, and Hajar bin Humeid which were the first major scientific expeditions ever to explore South Arabia and determine the correct historical chronology and establish a solid basis for the paleography of South Arabia in the Spring of 1950 and Winter/Spring 1951 respectively. The results of these expeditions were published in the following five scientific volumes by the Johns Hopkins Press. In addition, many scientific articles and popular books and articles were published "Archaeological Discoveries in South Arabia," by Drs. Richard Le Baron Bowen, Jr. and Frank Albright.

He wrote: Sorry for the tardy reply. A couple of possibilities occur. Have you thought of trying the Omani Ministry of Culture? We have here the National Maritime Museum at Greenwich. It is probable there are US equivalents. Given that you emphasize dhows, Indian maritime groups may be interested, especially as your father did what for the time was a pioneering work on the seacraft of the Indus Culture. Hope this helps.

“Researches in South Arabia,” by Richard LeBaron Bowen, Jr. with Chapters bu Gus W. Van Beek and A. Jamme, April 4, 1958. It states that pages 3-153 are reprinted without changes in pagination from “Archaeological Discoveries in South Arabia,” Richard Bowen, Frank Albright, The John Hopkins Press, Baltimore, 1958. [**PUB-1**]. The book is rich in illustrations (many hand drawn maps by RLB, high quality photographs). Chapters include:

1. Archaeological survey of Beihan
2. Ancient Trade-Routes in South Arabia.
3. Irrigation in Ancient Qataban (Beihan)
4. Burial Monuments of South Arabia
5. Ancient Frankincense-Producing Areas
6. The She’b edh-Dhaqab Inscriptions
7. Dating the Hureidha Irrigation Ruins

“Archeological Discovers in South Arabia,” Richard L. Bowen, Jr and Frank Albright, with contributions by Berta Segall, Joseph Ternbach, A. Jamme, Howard Comfort, and Gus W. Van Beck, with a forward by Wendell Phillips. This book has 214 Illustrations and is 315 pages [**PUB-2**]. The contents include the first seven sections from the prior book and adds:

3. Inscription Related to the house Yafash
4. Imported Pottery an Glass from Timna
5. Part II

“The Early Arabian Necropolis of Ain Jawan: A Pre-Islamic and Early Islamic Site on the Persian Gulf,” by Richard LeBaron Bowen, Jr with chapters by Frederick R. Matson and Florence E. Day. Published in Bulletin of the American Schools of Oriental Research: Jerusalem, Baghdad. Published by the American Schools of Oriental Research (Drawer 93A, Yale Station, New Haven, Conn), 1950, 70 pp. [**PUB-3**].

The opening paragraph: Work on this monograph on the burial mounds of Arabia started while the author was working as a chemical engineer in Saudia Arabia for the Arabian American Oil Company from 1945 to 1947. While working at the Ain Jawan (Arabic ‘Ain Jawan [a hat is over the last a]) quarry shortly after arriving in Arabia, the author started to collect data on the burial mounds and tombs that were being methodically destroyed as the quarrying activities of the oil company demanded more and more rock for making concrete and surfacing roads.

“Marine Industries of Eastern Arabia,” Richard LeBaron Bowen, Jr, 17pp (Reprinted with New Pagination from the July 1951 Issue of the The Geogrpahical Review). [**PUB-4**].

The closing paragraph is interesting: Oil has thus been able to offer salvation to the lowly coastal worke of the Persian Gulf. A man in debt can now get a job with an oil company and pay off his debt. So effective has this proven that the Kuweit, Bahrein and Saudia Arabian nakhodas (sic) have difficulty in getting men to send to the pearl fisheries, or to man the sailing ships going to India and Africa. However, oil has yet to

come to Oman, so that pearlers still leave the Trucial Coast in large numbers, and many Ohan dhows from Sur still sail down to Africa.

“Pearl Fisheries of the Persian Gulf,” Richard LeBaron Bowen, Jr., Reprinted with new pagination from the April 1951 Issue of *The Middle East Journal*. 20pp [PUB-5].

The final paragraph: *The Trucial Coast has yet to have the oil boom wash its shores. Today many men still make the northern trek from the Batinah coast, and the nakhodas there have little difficulty in finding pearling crews. But the happiest Arabs in the Gulf are the Sheikhs in the oil areas, for even though their revenue from pearls is at an all time low, they now get their cut from oil, a much more lucrative and reliable commodity.*

“Primitive Watercraft of Arabia,” Richard LeBaron Bowen, Jr. Reprinted with new pagination from the July 1952 Issue of the *The American Neptune*. 36pp. [PUB-6].

The final paragraph: *While the west coast of India is undoubtedly responsible for many of the primitive forms of watercraft found in Arabia, there has been a strange turnabout and the northwest coast of India has been strongly influenced in the last three centuries by Arab ship designs copied from European prototypes.*

“River Craft of the Lower Nile,” Richard LeBaron Bowen, Jr. Reprinted with new pagination from the January 1952 Issue of the *The American Neptune*. 7pp [PUB-7].

The opening sentence: *Although Cairo has long been the crossroads of the Middle East, apparently no one has taken the time to record the Nile River craft around Cairo.*

“Eastern Sailing Affinities,” Richard LeBaron Bowen, Jr, Reprinted without change in pagination from the April 1953 (Part 1: Page 81-117) and the July 1953 (Part 2; pp 183-211) Issues of Volume XIII of *The American Neptune*. [PUB-8].

He dedicates the article to the late James Hornell who has written extensively on indigenous watercraft. Bowen asserts: *When considering the sails of Oceania, one must start with Indonesia, from whence it is suspected that many migrations started; one must also examine the areas to the west - - India, Arabia, and Madagascar – where it is known that Indonesians migrated. And later in the introduction: Until contrary evidence is produced we must accept the home of the sail as the Nile River, for the square sail was used in pre-dynastic times (circa 3100 B.C.) in Egypt. This article will demonstrate that many similar sail types have evolved independently in separate areas – all from simple square form.*

“The Origins of Fore-and-Aft Rigs: Part 1,” Richard LeBaron Bowen, Jr., Reprinted from the *American Neptune*, Volume XIX, Number 3, July 1959. Pp 155-306 [PUB-9].

The opening sentence: *We are concerned in this essay with the invention of the fore-and-aft sails and lug and lateen sails, their evolution, and their diffusion around the world. This has often been attempted before, but usually only segments of the whole picture have been treated. Most writers can be accused of taking a Ptolemaic rather than a Copernican outlook. Until recently all fore-and-aft sails have been considered late inventions of the West. To decide properly who invented what, the sails of the East and West must be considered together in the whole range of time. The Arabian linkage is found on the last page where he defined seven major periods of sail diffusion with the sixth being: The Arab expansion: this period ran from about 700 A.D., to 1,000 A.D.,*

“Arab Dhows of Eastern Arabia, Richard LeBaron Bowen, Jr. Rehoboth, Massachusetts, Privately Printed, 1949, pp 54. Note: He has an extensive bibliography of over 45 references many of which I think we have in storage [PUB-10].

Subtitle is: *A dissertation on the sailing characteristics of the lateen-rigged Arab watercraft of the western Persian Gulf, with a discussion of the probable evolution of the lateen rig and a consideration of the development and the construction of the Arab Dhow.*

“The Dhow Sailor.” Richard LeBaron Bowen, Jr., Reprinted from the American Neptune, Volume XI, Number 3, July 1951 [PUB-11].

The final paragraph: *While traffic in human cargo is virtually a thing of the past, the dhows that coast along the Arabian, African and Indian shores still have slave crews on them. Although not owned bodily, the crews are bound economically to their masters, the nakhodas, while the nakhodas themselves are economic slaves of the merchants. But, while the crews get little actual compensation when the pay-off finally comes, they are happy and well-fed and have known nothing else. Allah is compassionate, and there is always a Paradise waiting for their poor souls!*

“Experimental Nautical Research: Third Millennium B.C. Egyptian Sails,” Richard LeBaron Bowen, Jr., Reprinted from The Mariner’s r, Volume 45, 1959, pp. 332-337 [PUB-14].

This article uses old drawings of sailing ships and calculates ability of ships to sail various courses relative to the wind direction.

“Egypt’s Earliest Sailing Ships,” Richard LeBaron Bowen, Jr., Reprinted from Antiquity, XXXIV, 1960, pp. 117-131 [PUB-15].

This article blends history, weather, and nautical engineering. He starts with paintings of sailboats on pottery from 3100 BC in Egypt. He concludes with “the earliest sailing boats could only sail a few degrees off the wind, but that was all they need for the currents and the prevailing winds (north/south) of the Nile.

“Some Notes On. . . Boat Bailers,” Richard LeBaron Bowen, Jr., Reprinted The Mariner’s Mirror, Volume 45, July 1959, pp. 255-260 [PUB-16].

An enthralling topic..... [I think boat bailer in Figure 5 is in my basement].

“Maritime Superstitions of the Arabs,” Richard LeBaron Bowen, Jr. Reprinted without change in pagination from the January 1955 Issue of Volume XV of *The American Neptune*. 48pp [PUB-12].

The opening sentence: *Painting ‘eyes,’ known as oculi, on the bows of boats is a widespread custom among mariners and fisherman in the Old World from the Mediterranean to China.* The final paragraph: *In summary we see that the Romans probably introduced the oculus to India in the early centuries of the Christian era, and that the South Arabians copied the idea from either the Romans or the Indians about the same time. The Arabs spread the oculus down the East African Coast sometime before the seventh century A.D. The Indians spread the oculus to Java, and perhaps to Sumatra, too, sometime before the eighth century. There is no evidence to show that the oculus was widespread in Indonesia; today it is only found at Bali. It seems that the Chinese borrowed the oculus from the Indians sometime in the early centuries of the Christian era and are responsible for many of the forms found between Burma and China. The lack of*

the oculus in the island groups of Melanesia, Micronesia, and Polynesia is further evidence for a late date of introduction into the Eastern seas.

“Origin and Diffusion of Oculi,” Richard BeBaron Bowen, Jr. Reprinted without change in pagination from the October 1957 Issue of Volume XVII of *The American Neptune*. Pp 262-291 [PUB-13].

This appears to be an old fashion intellectual war. His opening sentence: *In a recent criticism Professor Carroll Quigley has challenged (in a 7 page article in The American Neptune) the conclusions I reached as to the origins and diffusion of boat oculi.* It takes

Dr Bowen 29 pages to defend himself and concludes with a ten point argument!

“Echinoderms of Tarut Bay and Vicinity, Saudi Arabia,” by Austin H. Clark, “With Notes on Their Occurance,” Richard LeBaron Bowen, Jr. American Museum Novitates, Published by the American Museum of Natural History, City of New York, January 6, 1949, Number 1390. Pp 262-291 [PUB-17].

As the title states, with the knowledge that an echinoderm is “a marine invertebrate of the phylum *Echinodermata*, such as a starfish or sea urchins.

There is a near final manuscript entitled “**Boats for the 4rth Millenium BC**” (BX_5073) . There are many manila folders that support this work and his other nautical publications: BX_5702, and others.
